Donations

Donations to LaGrange County Community Foundation for the year totaled over \$270,000. Besides numerous individual gifts, the 2011 total included grants from the Lilly Endowment, Olive B. Cole Foundation and Dekko Foundation. The Community Foundation enables our county to benefit from donations of every size.

Grants and scholarships awarded

Nearly \$200,000 in grants and scholarships were distributed in 2011 - primarily in support of non-profit organizations providing fundamental services for at-risk families, GED instruction and for the tuition expenses of local students bound for college.

In addition to scholarships paid out directly from the assets of the foundation, \$185,000 in Lilly Endowment Community Scholarship awards were administered by foundation board and staff as part of a grant awarded through Independent Colleges of Indiana.

A total of 73 grants to organizations and 55 scholar-ships to individuals were awarded in 2011.

2011 - a year of partnerships and service

Forming partnerships that leverage limited local resources and create unique and valued funding opportunities is part and parcel to the on-going mission of the Community Foundation. Our Board of Directors aspires to make the very best use of donor gifts to the maximum benefit for local families

For example, early in 2011 the Community Foundation proactively granted to our local United Fund the entire \$6000 dollar-for-dollar match requirement needed to qualify for a 1010 grant from the Indiana Association of United Ways (IAUW). The grant opportunity was designed to encourage new gifts to the United Fund annual campaign. As expected, our partner campaigned tirelessly and, as hoped, the Community Foundation match was fully met. This total earned the full grant award from IAUW of \$11,175.

The final return on this shared investment was \$12,000 for the KennyBurkett Health Clinic, \$6,000 for the Parkview's LaGrange Medical Assistance Program and \$5,175 going to support other United Fund efforts.
