# Their Mission:

## Teach Kindergarten students to cook. Is that even possible?



To many, being a classroom teacher seems to be an impossible undertaking. How do you manage a classroom of students with widely different backgrounds, skill levels and capabilities and move all students forward over the course of the year while managing to teach a multitude of state standards? Thankfully we have many creative teachers in our county who know how to do all that.

But, teaching a large group of 5 year olds to cook? That does seem like something that would fall into the Mission Impossible category until you meet Brooke Ingram and Jenisa Collier and hear what they are doing every Friday in the classroom. Their students think they are just having fun, but these two resourceful teachers have come up with a creative way to teach their students several standards, such as reading,

following directions, counting, measuring and many more. Plus the students learn valuable social skills such as working on a team, sharing and taking turns.

The students all look forward to Cooking in the Classroom. Cookies, soups and even a Thanksgiving dinner have all been on the menu, thanks to a Teacher Grant from the Washington County Community Foundation. Jenisa and Brooke applied for a grant to purchase a microwave, mixer, small oven, mixing bowls, measuring cups and measuring spoons. They use these tools to teach their students how to cook, and by extension, several very important classroom standards. However, one of their biggest challenges remains: Answering the weekly question, "Who gets to lick the spoon?"

For many years now, the Washington County Community Foundation has issued grants to Washington County classroom teachers for innovative classroom projects. We hold two grant cycles. One is for all teachers in the county and these grants are funded through the D. Jack Mahuron Fund for Education. The second grant cycle is for Salem teachers only. These grants are from the Salem Schools Giving Tree Fund, which is totally funded by a payroll deduction program at that school. We have seen firsthand that when you give a teacher a little bit of money to do something special in the classroom, the impact can be tremendous. Like tossing a pebble in a pond, these grants have a large ripple effect.

# Their Mission: Continue to give back... for hundreds of years.

Edgar and Elinor DeJean started their journey through life when they met at Indiana University. They were married in 1944 and after Edgar completed his military service at Valley Forge Army Hospital as a dentist, they set up residence in Salem, Indiana where they started their mission in life.

While they were busy raising six children, Edgar went back to school to specialize in Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery, and then later to obtain an advanced degree in Dentistry. Elinor went back to school to complete her degree in education from IU.

During this time, they also started giving back to our community. Elinor led Cub Scouts, was involved with her children in 4-H, Brownies, and Girl Scouts. Later, she became an active member in PEO and Tri-Kappa, and volunteered for institutions and programs including the Washington County Hospital, the Friends of the Library, and adult literacy training. Edgar served 23 years on the Salem School Board, several years on the Park and Rec Board, on the Board of Directors of the

Washington County Community Foundation, and two terms on the County Council. He helped to establish Awareness Washington County and the Salem Education Foundation.

Edgar and Elinor generously gave back to our county for decades, so much so that it became second nature and a primary mission for them in their lives. It only made sense to establish a lasting legacy for our community through our Foundation, so that they can continue to give back to Washington County, forever. Because he was so instrumental in establishing the Salem Education Foundation, the SEF created a fund for Edgar that will issue scholarships to help students beginning their sophomore year of college. When Elinor passed away last year, family and friends wanted to create her legacy as well, so the fund evolved into the Edgar and Elinor DeJean Lion Legacy Scholarship Fund. This fund enables Edgar and Elinor to give back to our community and help people for centuries to come.



Does this sound like an impossible mission: Giving back for hundreds of years? Actually, we can make that quite possible.... Just ask the members of our Morris Society. # Their Mission is Now Possible!!



Aaron Johnson, Rachel Dalton Manias, Caitlin Agan and Mallery Deaton, the Washington County Youth Foundation officers who spearheaded the Happily Ever After Project start-up and created the mission.

You are never too young to pursue your mission in life. Just ask Caitlin Agan, Rachel (Dalton) Manias, Mallery Deaton, and Aaron Johnson. In June of 2010 they were getting ready to start their senior year of high school; they were the incoming officers of the Washington County Youth Foundation; and they wanted to do something big.

They came up with a huge idea: promote early literacy in our county. They all knew kids who were poor readers in elementary and later dropped out. They wanted to foster a love of reading in every child's life. And, they wanted to start right away. They created the Happily Ever After Project. "Life is so difficult when you can't read," stated Caitlin. "We wanted to do something that would help our kids learn to love to read. We knew that would help to give them a great start in life."

They understood that the Happily Ever After Project would be a marathon, not a sprint. The change they hoped to make would take years. As Aaron stated in 2010, "We can't make a difference overnight, but we can make a difference over time. If we can get all of our third graders reading at grade level, then more of our kids in Washington County will grow up to live Happily Ever After."

They identified their mission and then the Washington County Youth Foundation got to work. They launched the Happily Ever After Project. Phase I started a few months later. It entails high school students reading to elementary students weekly to promote a love of reading in our young children. Phase I concentrates on second and third graders, and incorporates a lesson plan with each book. Three times a year, we have a book give away, thanks to local sponsors. So far, we have given away almost 10,000 books! "Growing up in Washington County did so much for me," explained Mallery. "I feel that this program will give every child a good start. This is something that I hope will continue so I can continue to support it."

Phase II, the Dolly Parton Imagination Library, started this year. Any child in Washington County under the age of five can participate for free. Once a child is registered, s/he will receive an age appropriate book every month, in the mail. Imagine the excitement of a child who gets mail

every month.... and it's a book! Very quickly, these children look forward to their next book in the mail, thus promoting a love of reading. "As a teacher I realize now the value of kids having books in the home," Rachel explained. "I see a lot of kids who have never had a book read to them before starting school. The difference is amazing. Some kids who grew up without books do not even understand the concept of turning a page. They are already at a disadvantage on the first day of school."

"It is amazing to see how the Youth Foundation has flourished," commented Aaron. "When we dreamed this up, it was our hope that future Washington County Youth Foundation members would feel as passionately about it as we did. Thanks to all the members over the years who have helped to take the Happily Ever After Project to the next level!"

Aaron, Caitlin, Mallery, and Rachel would like to thank everyone in our community who has helped to make the Happily Ever After Project such a success. Teachers, volunteers, sponsors.... Without them, we would not have such a wonderful program. Truly, it takes a lot of people to make an endeavor this large successful.

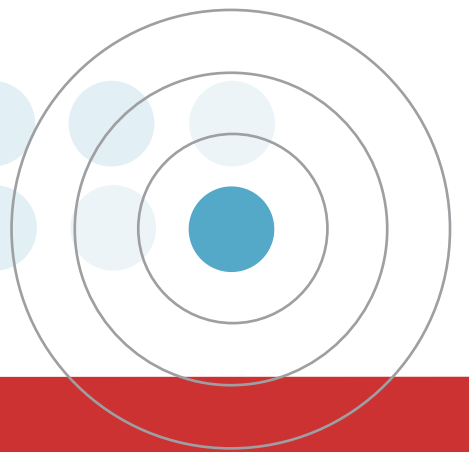
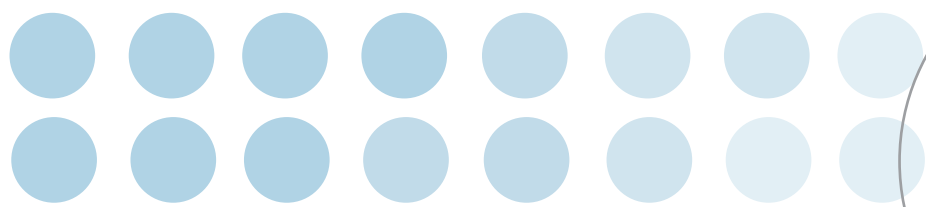
