• In Fall 2005, the Community Foundation played a major role in a collaborative effort that personally delivered \$2 million to grassroots, Gulf Coast nonprofit agencies in the wake of Hurricane Katrina.

- In late 2005, the Community Foundation's new building opened to the public. Dozens of nonprofit organizations have used the facility, and it has become a well-known community meeting place.
- Twenty new funds were established in the past fiscal year by individuals, families and businesses. A Foundation fund can be an alternative to a private foundation, a great planning tool for philanthropy, and a wonderful way to leave a legacy.
- In early 2006, our Board of Trustees approved a completely new investment structure. This was the culmination of many months of work by the Foundation's Investment Committee. It is a low-cost, sophisticated approach that takes full advantage of the Foundation's "buying power" as an institutional investor.
- In the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006, the Community Foundation distributed \$4.4 million in grants, mostly to organizations right here in Northern Colorado.
- In just the last few months, five nonprofit agencies have established agency endowments with the Community Foundation as they seek to build permanent resources for the future. The Foundation offers agencies a turn-key, high-quality investment program and complete planned giving services for their donors.
- In Fall 2006, the Community Foundation kicked off UniverCity Connections, an exciting project designed to better connect Colorado State University, Downtown Fort Collins and the natural environment. The Community Foundation is providing financial support and staff support, combined with leadership from its board members.

"Bringing People Together" is not just our slogan – it is truly what we do. The Community Foundation's role as a promoter of philanthropy, a convener of community leaders, and a service provider to donors and nonprofits is both unique and invaluable. All of you who choose to utilize the services of the Community Foundation are contributing to the overall value the Foundation adds to our region.

Why should I establish a fund at the Community Foundation?

It is an easy, effective, and enjoyable way to achieve your philanthropic goals. A fund provides an immediate tax deduction, great flexibility, a vehicle for philanthropic planning, and a wonderful way to leave a legacy. We have extensive experience dealing with local issues and needs. We also provide highly personalized service tailored to each individual's charitable and financial interests.

How do I establish a fund, and how long does it take?

Simply decide which type of fund best meets your interests and needs, determine your charitable priorities, select a name for the fund, and make an establishing gift. We can typically prepare and complete the written Fund Agreement in one hour.

What type of fund should I establish?

The Community Foundation has several types of funds available to help you accomplish your charitable goals. Our staff can help you select one or more that suits your philanthropic needs. For more information, see page 12 or visit www.cfnc.info.

How much do I need to establish a fund?

Most funds can be established with a minimum \$10,000 gift. We do not charge a set-up fee.

Does the Community Foundation charge an annual fee to maintain the fund?

We charge a very low annual administrative fee ranging from 1% to 2%, depending on the type of fund established. Our staff can answer questions regarding the fee structure.

Can I advise how my funds will be invested?


Yes. The Community Foundation offers three investment pools (Conservative, Balanced or Growth), and donors may recommend the one that best meets their needs and interests. Additional options are available for funds of \$100,000 or more. The staff can assist you with this process.

What kinds of assets may I use to open a fund?

Funds may be established with cash, securities traded on major exchanges, closely held stock, mutual fund shares, real estate, IRAs (in 2007 only), bequests, interests in limited partnerships, and more. Our staff is experienced at evaluating unusual assets and can accommodate them when suitable for charitable purposes.

May I select the name of the fund?

Absolutely. You may use your own name, names of individuals to be honored or memorialized, or the name of your business. Some donors select a more general name to retain anonymity.

GARY AND CAROL ANN HIXON FAMILY FUND

When Carol Ann and Gary Hixon moved to Fort Collins 40 years ago, they weren't planning to stay.

But the Hixon family fell in love with the area and got involved in multiple aspects of their adopted home town, including local art groups.

"We began to realize the importance of community," Carol Ann Hixon said. "Community is based upon giving and receiving. We've received such a wonderful life in this community that we feel it's important for us to help continue that quality of life."

To preserve the legacy of Fort Collins's strong sense of community, the Hixons formed the Gary and Carol Ann Hixon Family Fund in December 2005. This donor advised fund of the Community Foundation of Northern Colorado seeks to encourage Fort Collins arts initiatives that reflect vision and innovation.

"Arts groups are critical to the quality of life that we have," Hixon said. "Theirs is a constant struggle for funding, and even small amounts of funding encourage them."

Nonprofits that have benefited from the fund include the Fort Collins Symphony, Bas Bleu Theatre Company, Canyon Concert Ballet, Open Stage Theatre, Larimer Chorale and Fort Collins Museum of Contemporary Art.

"Starting the fund was a way to do what we've always done, but in a more organized, efficient manner," Hixon said. "The Community Foundation helps us support arts and educational initiatives in the community, and we're able to avoid the restrictions placed on private foundations."

Working with the Community Foundation of Northern Colorado has been a positive experience for the Hixons. The couple plans to involve their two daughters and sons-in-law in advising the fund, so they, too, can fulfill a legacy of giving.

CHRISLAND CHARITABLE FUND

When real estate services company Chrisland, Inc. formed in Northern Colorado, the founders and principals, Nicholas Christensen and Ryan Schaefer, put their drive for charitable giving into high gear.

Chrisland, Inc., based in Loveland, is known for such regional projects as 2534, a mixed-use development project at the intersection of Interstate 25 and U.S. Highway 34. In late 2005, Christensen and Schaefer decided to form the Chrisland Charitable Fund.

In its first year, this donor-advised fund of the Community Foundation of Northern Colorado has supported more than a dozen local nonprofits, including Neighbor to Neighbor, Project Self-Sufficiency, and Loveland Habitat for Humanity.

"We, as business owners in Northern Colorado, have a responsibility to give back to the community," Christensen said, "and the creation of this fund gave us the vehicle to do that."

The two businessmen chose to establish their fund through the Community Foundation because it gives them a more efficient way to accomplish their charitable goals. Christensen and Schaefer appreciate that their donor-advised fund gives them the simplicity and tax advantages of a public charity, combined with the personal recognition, involvement, and flexibility of a private foundation.

"We've both been charitable people in the past, but this really gave us an opportunity to go beyond that," Schaefer said. "The Community Foundation does a great job at managing the fund and makes the process very efficient."

Christensen and Schaefer have a passion for supporting organizations that provide people with the tools to become responsible for themselves. They said they enjoy giving to nonprofits that foster self-esteem and promote community leadership within all people.

The Chrisland Charitable Fund has also supported groups that focus on issues with devastating influence on the Northern Colorado region, such as the Multiple Sclerosis Society and the Muscular Dystrophy Association

"We're proud to be giving back and supporting so many charitable organizations in our own community," Schaefer said. "We are excited to grow the fund in the future as our business expands."

Billy and Christy Hernandez participated in Neighbor to Neighbor's Home Buyer Education program, and moved into their new Loveland home in August 2005 with their children, Isaiah, 6, Tiana, 14, and Dametrious, 11. Neighbor to Neighbor, a grant recipient of the Chrisland Charitable Fund, also offers counseling and rent assistance.





BOUCHARD FAMILY FUND

Charlie and Carolyn Bouchard have always believed in the power of community.

But the couple took their dedication to Northern Colorado to a new level last April by establishing The Bouchard Family Fund.

After living in the Loveland/Fort Collins area for 27 and 20 years, respectively, the Bouchards are now looking forward to focusing their attention on helping well-run nonprofits improve the lives of people with great needs.

"We have been very fortunate to make a good life here," Charlie Bouchard said, "and we believe that it is important to give back to people in the community who are less fortunate."

Charlie is A.G. Edwards vice president and branch manager in Loveland, and Carolyn is a community volunteer and former school teacher. They were attracted to the Community Foundation of Northern Colorado for their charitable giving goals due to the ease of creating and maintaining a donor advised fund.

Potential grant recipients may include Respite Care, Namaqua Center, Red Cross, Crossroads Safehouse and the Loveland Tutor Center.

"Carolyn and I also want to involve our children in the fund as a way to show them the value of giving back to their community." "Donor advised funds provide great flexibility, and our family will be able to use this fund to assist these agencies and any others we wish to support," Bouchard said. "The Community Foundation gives structure and permanence to our family's charitable giving."

He also appreciates that the Foundation pre-screens organizations so he and Carolyn can feel confident that they are donating to reputable and effective causes.

The Bouchard Family Fund originates from a love of community. They plan to teach their two middle-school-aged daughters how to become responsible successor-advisors to the fund to foster an appreciation of philanthropy and create a meaningful family legacy.

"I want to build substance in the fund," Bouchard said. "Carolyn and I also want to involve our children in the fund as a way to show them the value of giving back to their community."

TRIUMPH AWARDS SCHOLARSHIP ENDOWMENT FUND

The dark tunnel of childhood abuse and neglect can quickly extinguish the spirit of a young life.

But hope exists in the form of The Triumph Awards. This endowed scholarship was established by Realities for Children, a local organization that has provided services and emergency funding for abused, neglected and at-risk youth in Larimer County over the past 12 years.

Craig Secher, founder and president of Realities for Children, created the awards in 2001 to acknowledge teenagers who had overcome childhood abuse and neglect, and to help them thrive as young adults in school and in the community.

After several years, Secher realized the fundraising efforts were competing with the primary services of Realities for Children. Secher set a goal to build a \$500,000 endowment fund through the Community Foundation of Northern Colorado so his dream of a perpetual funding source could become a reality.

"The Community Foundation has really been a wonderful partner," Secher said. "Everyone there is invested in the community. I can't think of any organization that is as effective, efficient, and invested."

Every two years, six high school seniors receive the award, which includes a scholarship for further education and post-emancipation support services. All candidates are nominated by local nonprofit agencies.

"I think this award program does more than provide support for kids – there are a lot of people who are impacted by this," Secher said. "Younger children that have suffered abuse look to these young adults as an inspiration. They see that we live in a community where there is hope and opportunity to overcome their past and achieve their dreams."

Children under the state's care are emancipated when they turn 18, so recognition of their accomplishments and ongoing support helps the young adults continue to make progress toward achieving their goals. Thanks to community partnerships and support from the Community Foundation of Northern Colorado, Secher is excited to see the Triumph Awards Scholarship Endowment Fund continue to grow.

"I think the future is limitless," he said. "This is something that will be changing lives long beyond our own."

Rachel Langholf received a Triumph Awards scholarship to the University of Northern Colorado for nursing studies. She and her son, Skylar, acclimated well to college life. In her first semester, Rachel earned a 3.0 grade point average while working a part-time job.



GIVING OPTIONS

Working with the Community Foundation can provide great benefits that are not available to donors who create their own private foundation. The Community Foundation staff is available to liquidate property or other non-cash gifts and provide professional assistance with charitable giving.

A **donor advised** fund combines convenience, flexibility and value with the expertise of a full-time, professional staff. You can create a donor advised fund by signing a simple fund agreement and then advise the Foundation of your grant recommendations at any time throughout the year. Grants can be recommended by an individual, a family, or a committee. You can name successor advisors, and the fund can also be a beneficiary of your will, a gift annuity or a charitable remainder trust.

A **supporting organization** established in partnership with the Community Foundation provides the donor with the independence of a separate legal entity and a separate board, but with the advantages of "public charity" status. Supporting organizations can also take advantage of the administrative support and investment services already in place at the Community Foundation.

OTHER OPTIONS

Agency Funds are established by nonprofits to grow their endowments. The Community Foundation offers an investment program and planned giving services that involve complex assets, gift annuities, and trust arrangements. This partnership allows agencies to focus their staff and board time on marketing and solicitation efforts.

Designated Funds are established by individual or corporate donors who select one or more nonprofit beneficiaries at the time the fund is established. After the donor's lifetime, the fund will continue to support the agency unless it ceases to exist.

Field of Interest Funds are designated by the donors to benefit specific areas of interest such as education or human services. Grants from these funds are awarded to local nonprofit agencies by our Local Advisory Boards.

Scholarship Funds benefit students at colleges and universities throughout the United States. Specific criteria are established for each fund.

Operating Funds assist with the Community Foundation's operational expenses.

Unrestricted Funds are distributed to Larimer County nonprofit agencies and to local initiatives by the Community Foundation's Local Advisory Boards.






COMMUNITY FOUNDATION REPORTS RECORD-BREAKING YEAR FOR GRANTS

Thanks to the remarkable generosity of local citizens, the Community Foundation of Northern Colorado received \$85 million in donations and distributed a record-breaking \$4.4 million in grants to nonprofit agencies during the fiscal year that ended June 30, 2006.

In addition, the Foundation provided more than \$330,000 for special project expenses.

One of the key ways the Community Foundation promotes philanthropy is by investing in the vision, passion, and expertise of local nonprofit organizations.

The vast majority of grants are donor advised. The Community Foundation encourages donors to stay actively involved in the grants that come from the funds they establish. This applies to deceased donors who named their children and grandchildren as successor advisors, or designated particular agencies or fields of interest to benefit from endowed funds.








