Since 1924, The New York Community Trust, through its donors, has built a charitable endowment to support the nonprofits that make our city a vital and secure place in which to live and work. With \$1.8 billion in more than 1,700 charitable funds set up by individuals, families, and businesses, we made grants totaling \$139 million in 2004. message

from the chairman

Over the years, many donors have sought advice from The Trust about creating a permanent legacy to address the needs of our community. They realize that needs inevitably change and wish to provide for a grantmaking arrangement that will be effective over time.

We recommend that donors consider a field-of-interest or unrestricted fund. Either fund will provide the flexibility to meet the donor's objectives and the community's needs in the years ahead.

A donor who establishes a field-of-interest fund specifies an area of charitable interest; grants are made over time to the most effective charities involved in the area. Similarly, a donor who establishes an unrestricted fund directs that grants be made to nonprofits working on the pressing problems of the day.

As a result of this flexibility—and our staff and board's expertise on the City's critical issues—we believe that these funds are ideal arrangements for donors who want to provide a permanent way to benefit the community.

Two of our funds illustrate their effectiveness:

- Francis Florio, a real estate executive in New York, established a field-of-interest fund to alleviate human suffering resulting from life-threatening blood disorders. He created his fund years before the outbreak of AIDS. Nonetheless, because of the flexibility of a field-of-interest fund, we were able to make the first private grant for AIDS research from the Florio fund—a grant clearly consistent with Mr. Florio's objective but one he could not have anticipated when he created the fund.
- Lucy Wortham James, who died in 1938, bequeathed a substantial part of her estate to The Trust to establish an unrestricted fund. She said that she wanted her fund to be “flexible in response to the times... I do not want to make any rigid requests because circumstances may completely change the ideas which I hold at present.” During the more than 60 years since Mrs. James's death, grants from her fund have addressed a variety of urgent (and changing) needs in our city—many of which could not have been foreseen at the time of Mrs. James's death.

As I begin my first year as the chairman of the Distribution Committee, I want to thank Anne Sidamon-Eristoff for her outstanding service as chairman from 2001 to 2004. Anne's sound judgment, firm leadership, and gracious manner were invaluable during a challenging period in The Trust's and the City's history. We are fortunate that Anne remains a member of the committee.

I also want to salute our remarkable president, Lorie Slutsky, whose intelligence, dedication, and wise leadership have brought about the many successes The Trust has enjoyed in recent years. Lorie and her exceptional staff are The Trust's greatest assets. It is with pleasure that I present The Trust's Annual Report for 2004.

message

from the president

We are a nation divided. And while some pundits claim that this is not a new phenomenon, few would argue that the issues that separate Americans today are not only complicated and often emotional, but also are critical to our future as a democracy. From the separation of church and state to the role of government in people's lives, from tax policy to national security, debate rages.

It is taking place at a time when government is burdened by huge deficits, a difficult war, a battle over social security, and a contentious congress, all of which threaten the social contract that was established more than 70 years ago by the New Deal. In this environment, charities are inevitably expected to fill the gaps left when government reduces or eliminates funding for badly needed programs.

But charities, too, are under fire—and not only because of limited budgets. Press stories about fraud and abuse in charitable organizations have led to congressional scrutiny of the entire nonprofit sector, with both houses holding hearings. The Senate Finance Committee and the Joint Committee on Taxation have proposed legislative reforms, and a group of nonprofit leaders has been asked by the Senate to formulate recommendations.

The evidence of abuse is anecdotal and its scope can't be quantified, and I believe that it is not widespread. But nonprofits *should* be held to a higher standard, and not just because of our favored tax status. We depend on the public's trust—for money and, more important, to get a fair hearing for the compelling ideas, policies, and programs that percolate from the sector.

As charities grow in importance, it becomes even more critical that we take care of our problems and remove those who betray that trust. We must also learn to step back and look at our accomplishments. At The Trust, we are privileged to witness daily the good work of hundreds of nonprofits who dedicate their abundant talent and time to helping our city and its residents. We are grateful to them and to the generous New Yorkers, past and present, who set up funds with us and make this work possible.

giving

Sit (or stand) in a subway car with a gaggle of noisy teenagers (are there any other kind?), and watch the grownups: annoyance, amusement, fear, envy, indifference flit across their faces—sometimes all at once. The younger adults may cringe: Was I ever that silly? The older ones may think: What happened to manners? Most of us marvel at their exuberance.

And all of us, if we're honest, remember how difficult it is being a teenager: fitting in, finding out who you are, asserting your independence, dealing with sex, going to school, figuring out what you want to be. It's not easy for kids who live in stable, two-parent families with money and who go to good schools.

Add a single parent who works long hours, a lousy school, an unsafe neighborhood, not enough food or money for things teenagers *must* have, and the obstacles to becoming a productive, reasonably happy adult multiply. And for the kid who has recently immigrated, is neglected, abused, or in foster care, is pregnant or has dropped out of school, the obstacles seem insurmountable.

For 81 years, The Trust has put the money of thousands of donors to work helping children and families succeed, improving public schools, nurturing the arts, ensuring civil rights, protecting the environment, building community, and keeping people healthy. Of the \$139 million in grants that our board distributed in 2004, more than half was dedicated to children and youth. Helping them develop into strong, healthy, and competent adults, despite the odds, has long been one of The Trust's primary—and most important—goals. As with most difficult issues, a variety of approaches are needed. We start at the beginning, with prenatal care for poor women, teaching mothers how to care for their babies, training parents for decent jobs, supporting day care and early childhood development. We work to strengthen public education, fighting for adequate funding, mentoring teachers and aspiring principals, bringing arts and sports back to the schools, teaching tolerance, getting parents involved. We help build communities, advocating for affordable housing, encouraging small businesses, improving parks and open spaces, protecting the environment. We promote healthy lifestyles, educating teens about sex, AIDS, drug use, and obesity, and enhancing after-school activities, providing leadership opportunities, preparing them for college, exploring careers and training for jobs, helping them make good decisions. From drop-in centers for homeless gay and lesbian youth to college prep for poor students, from mental health counseling for African refugee youth to travel opportunities for teens who may never have left their boroughs, all these grants have one goal: to help young people get past the roadblocks in their way.



This annual report will focus on four projects; virtually all of the kids who participate are from low-income families, and some have no families at all. We visited the programs and talked with the kids about their experiences. We hope you'll be as proud and inspired as we are by their accomplishments.

BURNISHING A BALLROOM

Kids aging out of foster care are too often unprepared for making it on their own. Programs that help them learn a marketable skill and teach them how to work with others can make a huge difference in their lives. Common Ground Community Housing Development Fund Corporation owns and operates the Prince George Hotel in Manhattan as a residence for 416 homeless adults. The building's renovation received the Preservation League of New York's Excellence in Historic Preservation Award in 2001, but there wasn't enough financing to repair the large ballroom, which has marble floors, columns with gold leafing, elaborate woodcarving, and ceiling murals. With a Trust grant, Common Ground hired as apprentices a group of teens who are aging out of foster care and in jeopardy of becoming homeless. They learned woodworking, decorative plaster and painting, and flooring—and did beautiful work.

Here's what they say:

"I think the ballroom will look really nice. People will be impressed. They're not going to expect it from us. They see my du-rag and my baggy jeans and they think that appearance says a lot about me. I want them to know there's a lot more beyond appearance."

"I just want it to look perfect. I'm a perfectionist. I want people to come in here and say 'Wow!'"



TEACHING TOLERANCE

Racial and ethnic conflicts have always been with us, but conflagrations around the world have heightened tensions in many communities. The Museum of Jewish Heritage educates students and the public about 20th century Jewish life, using it to teach lessons of social justice, diversity, and the sanctity of life. Since 2000, the Museum has taken advantage of the City's diversity and brought in high school students from many backgrounds—including immigrants and some who have escaped war and violence in their home countries—and trains them to be docents, working with students who come to visit.

Here's what they say:

“When I tell people I'm working here they say, sometimes with a curse word, ‘Why are you working there?’ I'm trying to figure out why people say such things. I'm trying to further the relationship between Muslims and Jews.”

“Other cultures give you perspective on your own, and in that way, they are important.”

“Through working with all these people, I've learned so much about their cultures as well as Jewish heritage.”

“In New York, which is so diverse, and the cultural diffusion so amazing . . . it is particularly important to hold on to one's cultural identity.”

APPRECIATING THE ENVIRONMENT

Environmental concerns were once the province of affluent Americans who wanted to preserve pristine wilderness. That is changing, but many kids just don't relate. Friends of Van Cortlandt Park promotes,

preserves, and protects this beautiful park in the Bronx. A year-round environmental internship and greeters' program has attracted teens from local community centers and schools.

Here's what they say:

"I realized it was such a lovely park. I mean, I used to litter there, too, but now that I've learned its history and looked around, I think it's time to start taking care of this place."

"Van Cortlandt's a place for people to come to. It's a part of the community."

"My friends complain that they have nothing to do after school. They go home and sit around and watch TV. So I brought them with me to help clean up the park, and they love it."

"I told my friends, 'Why are you dirtying up the street? This is your place, your neighborhood.' I've learned to take care of what's mine."

"It's awesome! We get to work with kids from around the City and unite to protect the environment."

TRAINING SCIENTISTS

We don't have enough minority doctors and scientists. One contributing factor is the poor quality of science education in many City high schools, which also lack well-equipped labs. Dr. Sat Bhattacharya, a research scientist at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center, decided to do something about it. With his own money and small grants from the American Chemical Society, he approached senior scientists from some of the City's most prestigious research institutions and asked them to take talented high school students into their labs. Then he recruited the kids. In the summer, they work full time on research projects, and continue part time during the school year. With a Trust grant, Dr. Bhattacharya's program, called the Harlem Children Society, now works with 47 extraordinary students.

Here's what they say:

"It's wonderful. Because I'm taking samples of water to determine its quality, I get to row a boat, and I've learned how to swim."

"I've gotten to meet people from all over the City. I learn more from them than just science. Dr. Sat has given us this wonderful opportunity. Even though he's really busy, he always makes time for us."

"I'm working on the biological and cultural concepts of race with social scientists—it's a totally different experience for me. The program has opened career choices I hadn't thought about, and it's fun. I like to be busy; it makes me feel important and gives me a sense of accomplishment."

"I didn't know there were all these different kinds of doctors when I started, but now I'm interested in doing cancer research. I sleep about four hours a night, but it's great. I hate being bored. My friends think I'm crazy, but when they saw my project at the science fair they thought it was cool."

“At first, I was interested in art. But I’m good in math, so I did some research and decided that mechanical engineering combines both my interests; my internship has just confirmed that this is what I want to do. I’m also on a team that builds robots and we compete in a national competition. I got a \$100,000 scholarship from one of the colleges I applied to, but I turned it down when I found out it wasn’t that strong in my field. It was really hard to do, but I’m determined to go to the best college for me.”

“It’s been a great experience. I get to do my own research, and then to present my work. It gives me a chance to speak out.”

LEARNING FROM THE PAST

The Science, Technology, and Research High School (STAR) is an early college program to engage low-income students early and smooth their transition to college. Housed at Erasmus High School in the Flatbush section of Brooklyn, STAR is a joint effort of Brooklyn College and the New York City Department of Education. With a focus on math and science, all STAR students take seminars with Brooklyn College professors. Last summer, 22 motivated students, under the guidance of Professor Arthur Bankoff and 4 Brooklyn College students, participated in an archaeological dig at the Erasmus campus, which was built in 1787, and learned about the school’s history.

Here’s what they say:

“I thought this was just a school with some ground. But when we learned the school’s history, the school’s tradition, I found it interesting and felt privileged.”



“The professors respected me. They made sure that if I didn’t understand something, they would help. They didn’t baby us to make sure we understood at their level.”

“It made me feel more mature. I got respect from everybody and it made me work even harder.”

“The artifacts we dug up show what life was like back then. You can’t just learn about what happened; you have to experience it.”

“The main point is to learn about the people before you.”

OUR CHILDREN **ARE** OUR FUTURE

Teenagers are an unruly lot, but behind the bravado, the noise, and the sullen faces is a yearning to learn, to achieve, to be respected. What we’ve learned is that their desire and their energy—even for kids for whom life has been a continual challenge—can be harnessed to do a world of good for themselves and for their city. With the dedicated people who work in New York’s nonprofit community, and the generosity of charitable New Yorkers, The New York Community Trust will continue to invest in their—and our—futures.

how to apply for a grant

The Trust makes grants in four general areas: Children, Youth, and Families; Community Development and the Environment; Education, Arts, and the Humanities; and Health and People with Special Needs. We are committed to sticking with significant issues that may not lend themselves to quick or easy solutions, while remaining open to projects that tackle emerging problems and to organizations that may be new to us.

Grants are made primarily to nonprofit organizations located in the five boroughs of New York City. Our suburban divisions handle grants on Long Island and in Westchester (page 34). Grants for programs outside our area generally are from funds designated for specific charities or that have been made at the suggestion of donors.

Applicants should begin by requesting “Guidelines for Grant Applicants” and one or more of the four brochures that describe in detail each of our grantmaking areas. We also suggest that you request copies of our bimonthly grants newsletter to get a sense of the kinds of projects we currently fund. Please call our receptionist at (212) 686-0010, ext. 0, or visit our Web site, www.nycommunitytrust.org.

If, after you have read our guidelines, you believe that one of your proposed projects meets our criteria, send us a cover letter along with a completed application form (enclosed with the guidelines), and a copy of the proposal—not more than 10 pages plus appendices. Include in your letter a brief summary of the proposal, the amount requested, and the results expected. We do not accept proposals sent by fax or e-mail.

Please note that we do not make grants to individuals and rarely for endowments, building campaigns, deficit financing, films, general operating support, or religious purposes.

We have no specific submission deadlines. Our Distribution Committee meets six times annually, and grant applications are accepted throughout the year.

We will let you know within two weeks that we have received your material. During the review process, Trust program staff will analyze your proposal, determine if and how it fits into our grantmaking program, and check to see if there is adequate money available in an appropriate fund. We will get in touch with you if we have further questions or need more information.

The Trust welcomes your application, but because we cannot possibly fund every proposal submitted to us, we urge you to send yours to several other funders as well.

becoming a donor

The New York Community Trust offers donors with every kind of philanthropic interest an easy and flexible way to accomplish their charitable objectives and receive the maximum tax deduction allowed by law.

TYPES OF FUNDS

An **unrestricted fund** is a good option for donors who want to be assured that their gift will always be used to meet vital needs and improve the quality of life in New York City. Our staff is expert in identifying community needs and the nonprofits best equipped to meet them.

A **donor-advised fund** is an unrestricted fund legally, but the donor recommends the organizations to receive grants. Although we cannot, by law, be bound by these recommendations, we take them very seriously and approve grants to recommended nonprofits that meet charitable standards for programmatic and financial soundness.

In a **field-of-interest fund**, charitable giving is focused on issues of concern to the donor, such as child and family welfare, youth, education, human justice, conservation, or health policy. The Trust makes grants that meet current needs in the chosen fields. Field-of-interest funds can also be established to be advised by the donor.

A **designated fund** is for donors who want to support specific organizations but recognize that the world may change. They establish a designated fund in The Trust rather than leave it directly to the charity to assure that their gift remains relevant over time and responsive to changing circumstances. (See page 23 for an explanation of the variance power.)

SETTING UP THE FUND

Each donor establishes a fund with a minimum of \$5,000. Donors first decide what they want to accomplish with their philanthropy; our staff is happy to help clarify and refine goals. They then choose the name of the fund, typically using their own names or the names of individuals to be honored or memorialized. Donors who prefer anonymity can choose a general name.

There are at least three ways of giving to a fund with us.

Giving Now: You can set up a fund to support charities during your lifetime and endow them to continue your philanthropy for future generations. Many of our donors regularly add money to the funds they have established.

Deferred Giving: Donors can set up funds through deferred-giving arrangements. A key feature of many estate plans is a tax advantage to you now for the commitment of a charitable gift later. Charitable Remainder Trusts, Charitable Lead Trusts, and gifts of life insurance or retirement plan assets can all be used.

Wills: After providing for personal bequests, you may include provisions for setting up a fund with us or adding to one you already have here. You will save estate taxes and ensure that the charitable work you care about will be continued.

"I fell in love with New York on a visit when I was ten years old. Fifth Avenue was a two-way street with double-decker buses, and anyone could name the five tallest buildings because they all looked different. I moved here right out of college, and never looked back, though I did, inevitably gaze deeper into the city.

Some New Yorkers win the brass ring, or were born with one, but many are grateful to just get through the day. It's a city of finalists and a city of drop-outs, and a lot of folks in between. Sometimes the extremes never cross paths.

At The New York Community Trust, it seems to me they do.

I consider myself one of the lucky ones, and I'm interested in many of the City's problems and opportunities: the arts, healthcare, spiritual care, gay and lesbian rights, kids, schools, immigrants struggling to learn enough English to get a decent job, the homeless, preserving great architecture. The list goes on. I'm a bleeding heart if there ever was one. The challenge for me has been finding a focus and taking manageable bites.

The staff at The Trust has helped me refine my personal response to the City's needs. I can't give to every good cause, but I can be part of the solution in specific areas. When I established my donor-advised fund, they took a look at the areas where I'd been most involved, and helped me evaluate specific nonprofits. The red flags and green lights they've offered in response to my suggestions have empowered me to make the most of what I can do.

New York City's parks and open spaces are a particular interest of mine because I believe they soothe the spirit, clear the mind, and bring all kinds of people together. I had never done much about it because, frankly, I didn't know where to begin. Two years ago I established a field-of-interest fund and asked Trust staff to make gifts from it to preserve and promote open spaces in the City. They have used these funds for projects I would never have known about or imagined were possible.

In due time, a good portion of my estate will go to The Trust because I believe these people are uniquely qualified to address New York's needs."

A grant from the Donnell Fund for Parks to the City Parks Foundation supports efforts to involve residents in Red Hook and Astoria/ Long Island to improve waterfront parks in their neighborhoods.

The Davis Polk & Wardwell Fund was a long time in coming to The Trust. Twenty years ago, the firm, acting as *pro bono* counsel, had sued on behalf of 70,000 female members of the New York City Employees' Retirement System.

The court ruled in favor of the women in 1981, and referred the case to a special master to formulate a remedy. Davis Polk lawyers met with Trust staff to discuss the possibility of creating a fund with us, using a portion of

the attorneys' fees they expected. They checked back every couple of years, and finally, in late 1997, the relief was finalized—resulting in benefits to the class members of hundreds of million of dollars—and the firm was awarded \$1.9 million in fees, all of which was contributed to charity. The fund was set up with \$1.3 million for “general charitable purposes, with special consideration for grants that benefit women,” and the firm’s partners asked Trust staff to make the grants.

Paul W. Bartel II, a partner at Davis Polk, was the lead lawyer in the case and instrumental in creating the fund. “We took this case on as a *pro bono* commitment to help benefit the community. When we were awarded attorneys’ fees, we decided, as a firm, that we wanted to use the award to benefit the community as well,” says Bartel. “The emphasis on women was a natural outgrowth. We have been delighted with the grants The Trust has made and we have been impressed with The Trust’s professionalism.”

In 2004, a grant to inMotion supported legal assistance to Latina girls and women who have suffered domestic violence.



ARLENE & REUBEN MARK



As Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of the Colgate-Palmolive Company for two decades, Reuben Mark has led his company’s philanthropic efforts in New York City, across the United States, and throughout the world.

He is a strong advocate for improving the City’s public schools and creating opportunities for students. Under his leadership, Colgate sponsored the rehabilitation of the Wadleigh School in Harlem, and its employees have remained involved since the school reopened in 1993. And Mr. Mark was an original Board member (and currently honorary member) of The Fund for New York City Public Schools, now called New Visions, a nonprofit that was incubated at The Trust.

Mr. Mark’s wife, Arlene, a school psychologist, has worked in New York City schools and is both the inspiration and partner in his passion for public education. Both of them had long donated to the causes they cared about, but almost twenty years ago they decided they wanted their philanthropy to be more purposeful—and they wanted to do it together. They looked for a mechanism that could help them accomplish their charitable goals and discovered The Trust. In 1986 they set up the Mark Family Fund—and have been making educationally oriented grants from their donor-advised fund ever since.

“They make it so easy,” says Mr. Mark. “They’re very responsive and get checks out to the charities within days of receiving the family’s grant suggestions. And, the staff is efficient and pleasant. They really care about what they are doing for New York.”

Several years ago, Mr. Mark reported, a financial advisor suggested that he set up a private foundation. “Why would we do that?” he responded. “We already have The Trust. The family gets great efficiency without the burdens of a private foundation.”

One of the many grants suggested by the Marks in 2004 was to The Valley, a multi-service program for kids and families in East Harlem.

TYPES OF ASSETS

Funds may be established with the following: cash, securities traded on major exchanges, closely held stock, mutual fund shares, retirement plan assets, real estate, interests in limited partnerships, and literature copyrights.

We are glad to discuss proposed contributions with you. We may not be able to accept assets that cannot readily be converted to the financial benefit of charity or that carry unusual potential liability.

FUND ADMINISTRATION AND FEES

A fund established with our organization may be held in trust with one of our 13 trustee banks (see page 38), or it may be held by Community Funds, Inc., our not-for-profit corporation. Both operate as The New York Community Trust with a single governing body. If a fund is set up in trust, the bank handles the investments. If it is set up in Community Funds, our distinguished Investment Committee oversees the performance of our outside portfolio managers. The determining factor is the inclination of the donor. The service we provide is the same.

Funds that are held in trust are also charged a trustee's fee set by the bank. It may be negotiated between the bank and the donor at the inception of the fund. It varies from bank to bank.

Our administrative fee charged to funds is remarkably low: 2.5 percent of grants paid or 3/10th of 1 percent (30 basis points) of assets, whichever is greater.

The Internal Revenue Service has classified The New York Community Trust and its affiliate, Community Funds, Inc., as "tax exempt" under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code; as a "publicly supported" organization under Section 170b(1)(A)(vi); and as "not a private foundation" under Section 509(a)(1). This status ensures donors the maximum tax benefit allowed by law. The Long Island Community Foundation and the Westchester Community Foundation (described on page 34) are divisions of Community Funds.

A FUND IN THE TRUST OR A PRIVATE FOUNDATION?

A fund in The Trust provides a very attractive alternative to establishing a private foundation. We are a public charity with the attendant tax advantages. A full-time professional staff takes care of all the administrative and grantmaking activities, eliminating the need to set up a separate institution, formulate policies, file innumerable forms, and monitor the status of grant recipients. Establishing a private foundation can take months and be costly; with The Trust, the legal apparatus is already in place, and creating a fund can take less than a day.

We also offer substantial advantages over most commercial donor-advised funds: lower fees, smaller minimums, the capacity to accept unusual gifts, and an in-depth knowledge of the nonprofit community. Because philanthropy is our business, we can help make sure that your money makes a difference.

guidelines for attorneys

Establishing a fund in The New York Community Trust for your client is a relatively straightforward process. Our comprehensive booklet, *Creating a Fund Here: Suggested Words and Procedures*, provides all the relevant information: The Trust's tax classification letter, descriptive material on the different types of funds, and suggested language to help you draft instruments to provide for gifts to our organization. Call us to receive a copy.

THREE IMPORTANT FACTS

First, we are unable to accept a fund unless its terms have been reviewed by us and found acceptable. It is particularly helpful if we review the language before the instrument is executed to ensure that we can meet the donor's purpose. Second, a co-trustee is not permitted under the *Resolution and Declaration of Trust Creating "The New York Community Trust."* Third, all our funds enjoy an important advantage: If a change of circumstances makes literal compliance with the terms of the gift instrument "unnecessary, undesirable, impractical, or impossible," our governing body is able to vary them. Donors are assured that their gifts will never become obsolete; they will remain useful to the community in perpetuity.

Donors have the option of setting up funds in The New York Community Trust with a bank as trustee or in our not-for-profit corporate affiliate, Community Funds, Inc. The organizations share a governing board and file a single tax return with the IRS.

CREATING A FUND IN THE NEW YORK COMMUNITY TRUST

The *Resolution and Declaration of Trust Creating "The New York Community Trust"* (the "R & D") is a complete trust instrument. It sets out in detail the powers and duties of the Trustee Bank and the Distribution Committee. In order to establish a fund in The New York Community Trust, the founding document—whether for a bequest or a gift during lifetime—must incorporate the R & D by reference.

An advantage of The New York Community Trust is that it is not a private foundation subject to certain requirements, and the separate funds that constitute The New York Community Trust are component funds of a public charity, not private foundations. It is important, therefore, that an instrument designed to create a new component fund in The New York Community Trust adhere strictly to the provisions of the R & D; please call us for a copy.

CREATING A FUND IN COMMUNITY FUNDS, INC.

Community Funds, Inc. is a New York State not-for-profit corporation. As with a fund in The New York Community Trust, a fund established in Community Funds becomes part of a publicly supported organization, and is not regarded as a private foundation. The fund is held and administered pursuant to the provisions of the Not-for-Profit Corporation Law. Please call us for a copy of the Certificate of Incorporation and By-Laws of Community Funds.

CREATING A FUND IN OUR LONG ISLAND OR WESTCHESTER DIVISION

Because the Long Island Community Foundation and the Westchester Community Foundation are divisions of Community Funds, donors have the same options described above.

notes to consolidated financial statements

THE NEW YORK COMMUNITY TRUST AND COMMUNITY FUNDS, INC.
(INCLUDING ITS LONG ISLAND AND WESTCHESTER DIVISIONS)

(1) Organization

The New York Community Trust and Community Funds, Inc. (including its Long Island and Westchester Divisions) are community foundations created to build permanent charitable endowments for the areas they serve. The Trust, as the consolidated foundations are hereinafter referred to, is tax-exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (the Code) and has been determined not to be a private foundation under Section 509(a)(1) of the Code. The Trust administers more than 1,700 individual charitable funds, each established with an instrument of gift describing either the general or specific purposes for which grants are to be made, usually from income only, but in some cases from principal.

(2) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Accounting standards provide that if the governing body of an organization has the ability to remove a donor restriction, the contributions should be classified as unrestricted net assets. However, under New York State law and the Trust's governing instruments, the assets are held as endowment funds until such time (if ever) as the governing body deems it prudent and appropriate to expend some part of the principal or appreciation. Accordingly, the consolidated financial statements classify all net assets as unrestricted, except for those net assets restricted for the September 11th Fund (see note 6), but segregate the portion that is held as endowment from the funds that are currently available for grants and administration.

Cash equivalents represent short-term investments with original maturities of 90 days or less, except for those short-term investments managed as part of long-term investment strategies.

Fixed assets are recorded at cost and are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the estimated life of the respective asset. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the life of the respective improvement or the remaining term of the lease, whichever is shorter. Fixed assets are reported net of accumulated depreciation of \$203,341 in 2004 and \$2,029,518 in 2003.

Investment expenses include fees for bank trustees, investment managers, and custodians.

Grants and services to beneficiaries are expensed upon approval of the Distribution Committee of The New York Community Trust or the Board of Directors of Community Funds, Inc.

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the consolidated financial statements prepared by management and are based upon management's current judgments. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Certain 2003 amounts have been reclassified to conform to the 2004 presentation.

(3) Investments

Investments are carried at fair value. The fair value of investments in common trust funds is based upon the fair value provided by the trust managers. Limited partnership interests are reported at fair value as determined by the general partner of each limited partnership. The carrying amounts of all other financial instruments approximate fair value.

(4) Pension and Postretirement Medical Benefit Plans

The Trust administers a noncontributory defined benefit pension plan covering substantially all employees. Benefits are based on years of service and the employee's compensation during the five highest consecutive years during the last ten years of employment. The Trust also provides medical insurance benefits for its eligible retired employees. The following sets forth financial information about the plans as of December 31, 2004 and 2003:

In 2004, an adjustment was made to prepaid pension to reflect a change in the method of allocation of plan assets which is included in other revenue.

The discount rates used to value the pension and other benefit plans range from 5.75% to 6.5%. The weighted average expected return on plan assets and rate of compensation increase for the calculation of the pension benefits is 8% and 4% as of December 31, 2004. The health care trend rate assumption for 2004 was 8% declining each year to 5% in 2010.

The pension plan is invested in a balanced portfolio of equity and fixed income securities. Annual projected benefit payments for the pension and other benefit plans are expected to approximate \$400,000 and \$50,000 through 2014, respectively.

The Trust also sponsors a defined contribution retirement plan for employees, in which contributions are based upon a specified percentage of salaries. Retirement plan expense was \$385,196 and \$393,300 in 2004 and 2003,

respectively.

(5) Commitments

On March 30, 2004, The Trust entered into a lease agreement for office space expiring March 31, 2020. Future minimum rental payments for the new lease are approximately \$879,000 in 2005, \$1.2 million in 2006 through 2009, and a total of \$14.3 million thereafter through 2020.

Rent expense for the years ended December 31, 2004 and 2003, net of sublease income of \$92,000 in 2004 and \$88,000 in 2003, amounted to \$1,010,500 and \$976,000, respectively.

(6) September 11th Fund

The Trust and United Way of New York City (United Way) established the September 11th Fund (the Fund) to help respond to the events of September 11, 2001. To assure that monies from the Fund were spent effectively, without undue delays, and in a manner that ensured accountability, they appointed a governing committee (the September 11th Fund Board) and retained a chief executive. The Trust and United Way authorized the Fund to establish grant guidelines and determine distributions from the Fund.

Both The Trust and United Way accepted contributions and processed grants for the Fund. The accompanying consolidated financial statements only show the amounts received and grants processed by The Trust. As of January 1, 2004, The Trust became the Fund's disbursing agent, and remaining balances at United Way were transferred. The

independent auditors' report

We have audited the accompanying consolidated statements of financial position of The New York Community Trust and Community Funds, Inc. An audit includes consideration of internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Organizations' internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provide a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the consolidated financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of The New York Community Trust and Community Funds, Inc. (including its Long Island and Westchester Divisions) as of December 31, 2004 and 2003, and the changes in their net assets and their cash flows for the years then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

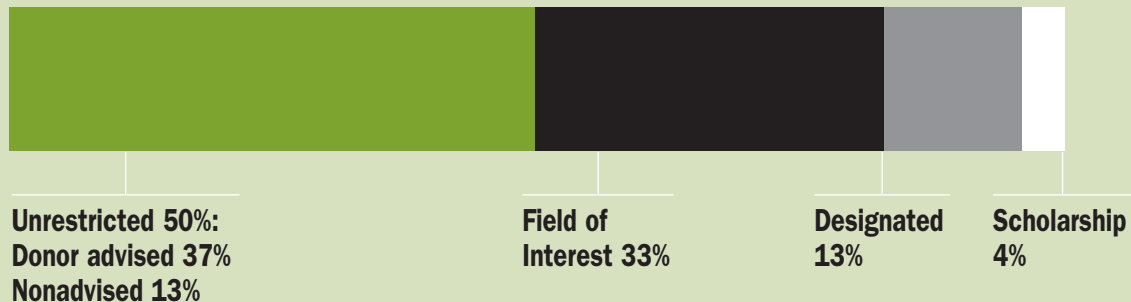

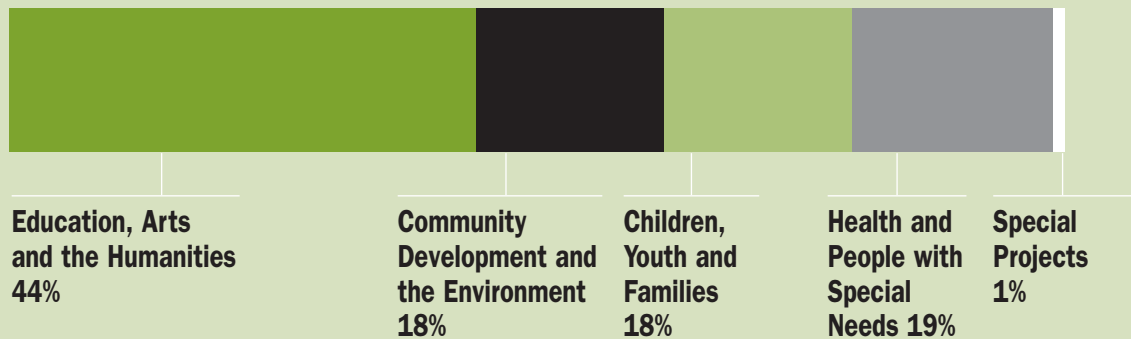

governing body

The governing body consists of 12 members who serve as the Distribution Committee of The New York Community Trust and as the Board of Directors of Community Funds, Inc. It is their responsibility to oversee our organization's operations and grantmaking.

Six members are nominated by civic authorities representing the public: one by the Mayor of the City of New York; one by the Chief Judge of the United States Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit; one by the Chairman of the New York City Partnership and Chamber of Commerce; one by the Chairman of Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts; one by the President of the Association of the Bar of the City of New York; and one by the President of the New York Academy of Medicine. The Trustees' Committee nominates five members, and the President of The Trust is a member by reason of office.

Members serve without compensation. They are selected for their judgment, integrity, and understanding of philanthropic needs. The Committee meets every two months throughout the year; subcommittees meet on a regular basis.

The Finance and Audit Committee monitors the financial operations of The Trust. The Investment Committee (see page 31) establishes asset allocation guidelines, recommends investment advisors and vehicles, and monitors investment performance. The Fund Purposes and Suggestion Review Committee assures that the provisions and intent of each donor's philanthropy are honored, and reviews grants suggested by donors to ensure that they meet our charitable guidelines.

In 1923, the banks of New York City envisioned the type of philanthropic organization that could best meet the changing needs of this community.

It would be set up to give wealthy people and those of moderate means an equal opportunity to accomplish their philanthropy within a flexible framework. The charitable funds they created would be permanently secure. The organization's governing body—an impartial and changing committee of New York citizens chosen for their understanding of philanthropic needs—would oversee the selection of charitable beneficiaries.

This was the beginning of The New York Community Trust. Thirteen banks and trust companies have adopted the "Resolution and Declaration of Trust Creating *The New York Community Trust*." The representatives of these financial institutions constitute the Trustees' Committee, and each bank is authorized to receive funds in trust for The New York Community Trust.

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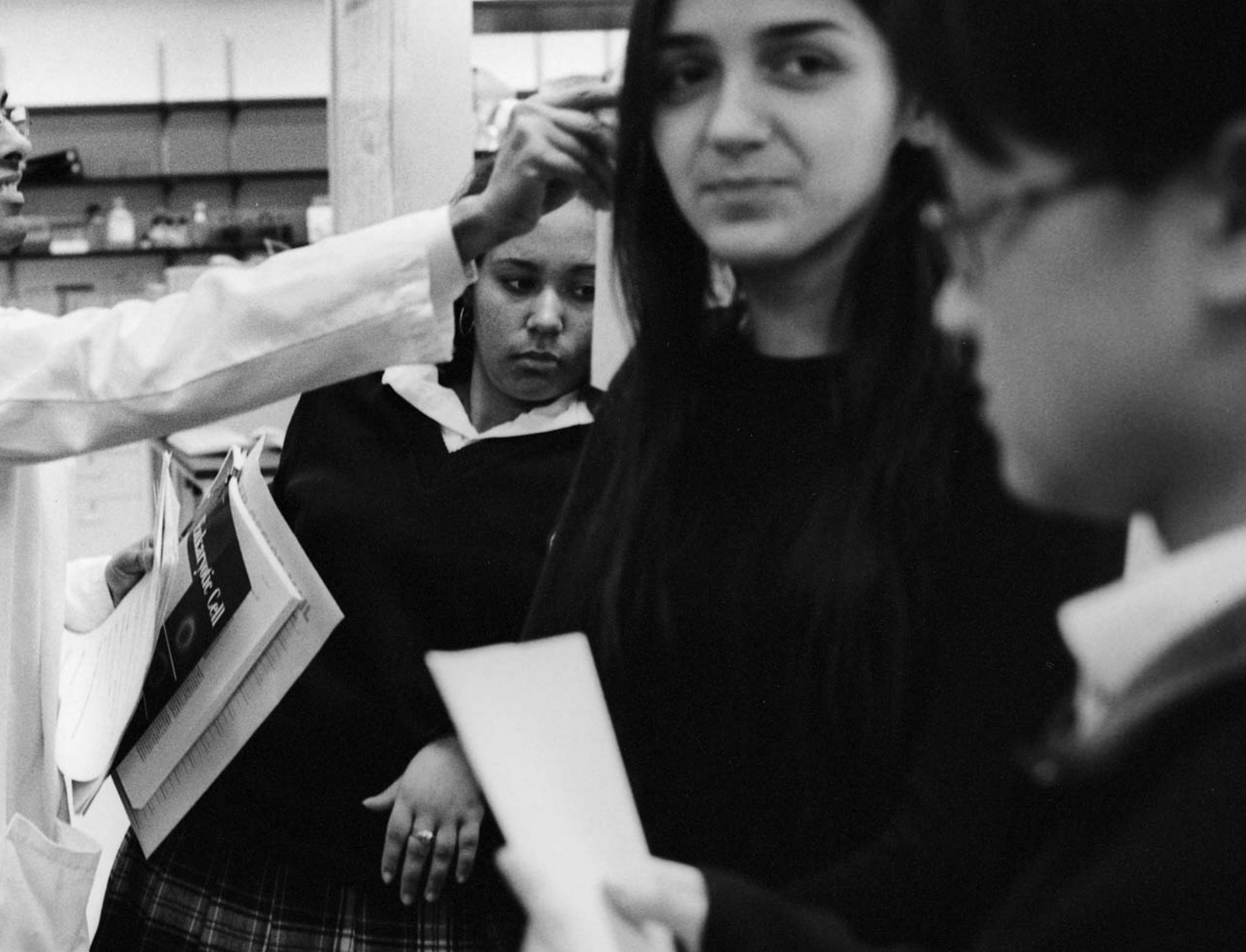
